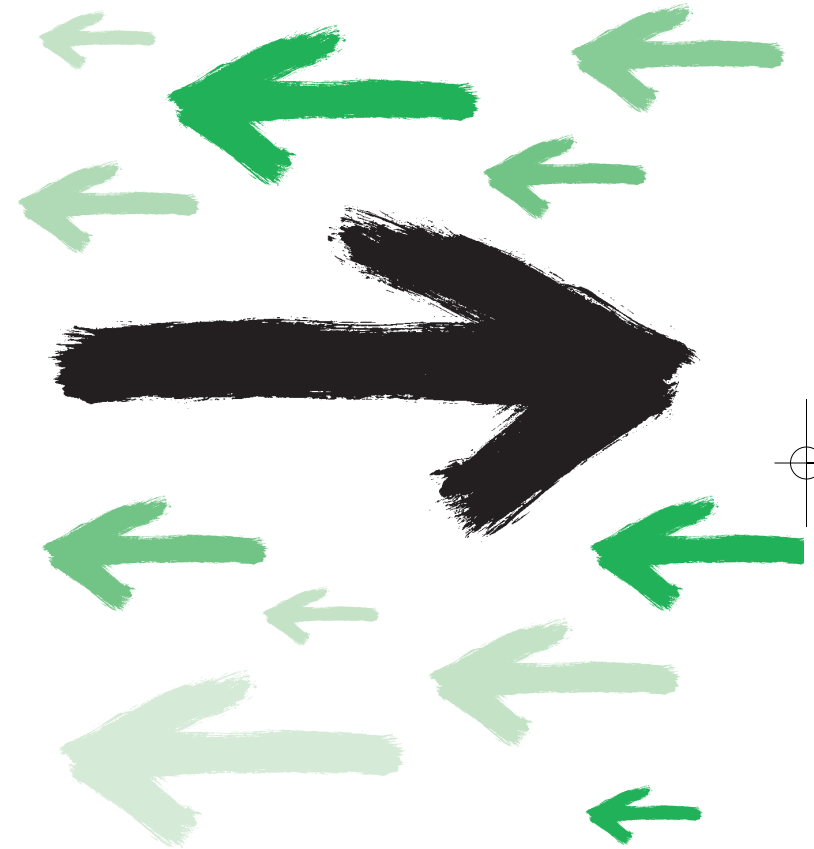

Trafficking is difficult to identify

Often children and young people do not know that they have been trafficked. They may have arrived accompanied by adults known to them, separated or unaccompanied. They may not want to tell their story for fear of not being believed, not knowing that they are victims of crimes or fear of getting into trouble. They may also still be under the control of their traffickers/exploiters.

Trafficking is a relatively new phenomenon that is a product of the social and economic changes in the world.

Do you know or work with a child or young person that may have been trafficked or is at **risk** of being trafficked?

Some of the indicators that they are at risk could include some of the following:

1. Brought or moved from another area or country
2. Separated children and young people
3. Missing
4. Homeless
5. Exploited
6. In some form of danger.

National Child Trafficking Advice and Information Line

This is a new service for everyone with concerns of human trafficking that:

- offers access to advice and information
- can give safeguarding guidance about children/young people who are suspected to have been, or who may have been trafficked internally and across borders
- offers presentations and case consultancy to professionals
- gathers informations and data to gain a wider understanding of the causes of and issues around trafficking
- works in collaboration nationally and internationally to prevent abuse from trafficking for children and young people.

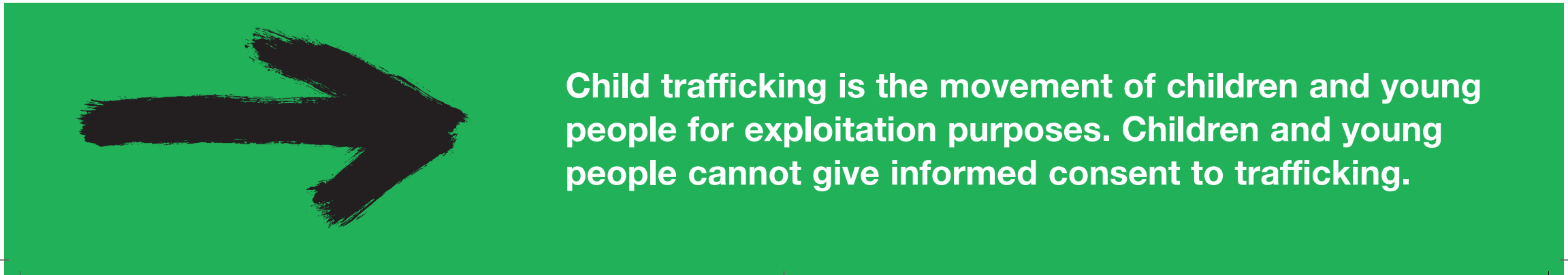
Child trafficking is defined as:

“ The recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of a child for the purpose of exploitation. Palermo Protocol ”

“ A child means every human being below the age of eighteen years. ”

UNCRC Article 1

- Has a child/young person that you know been misled about the reasons for coming to this country?
- Is a child being looked after by adults that you believe are not their family/relatives and this concerns you?
- Are you aware of a child/children working in unsuitable conditions without access to basic health care/education?
- Do you suspect that adults are controlling a child's/young person's movements and/or inappropriately influencing their behaviour?
- Do you know a child/young person who is displaying other worrying indicators of exploitation/trafficking?



Child trafficking is the movement of children and young people for exploitation purposes. Children and young people cannot give informed consent to trafficking.
